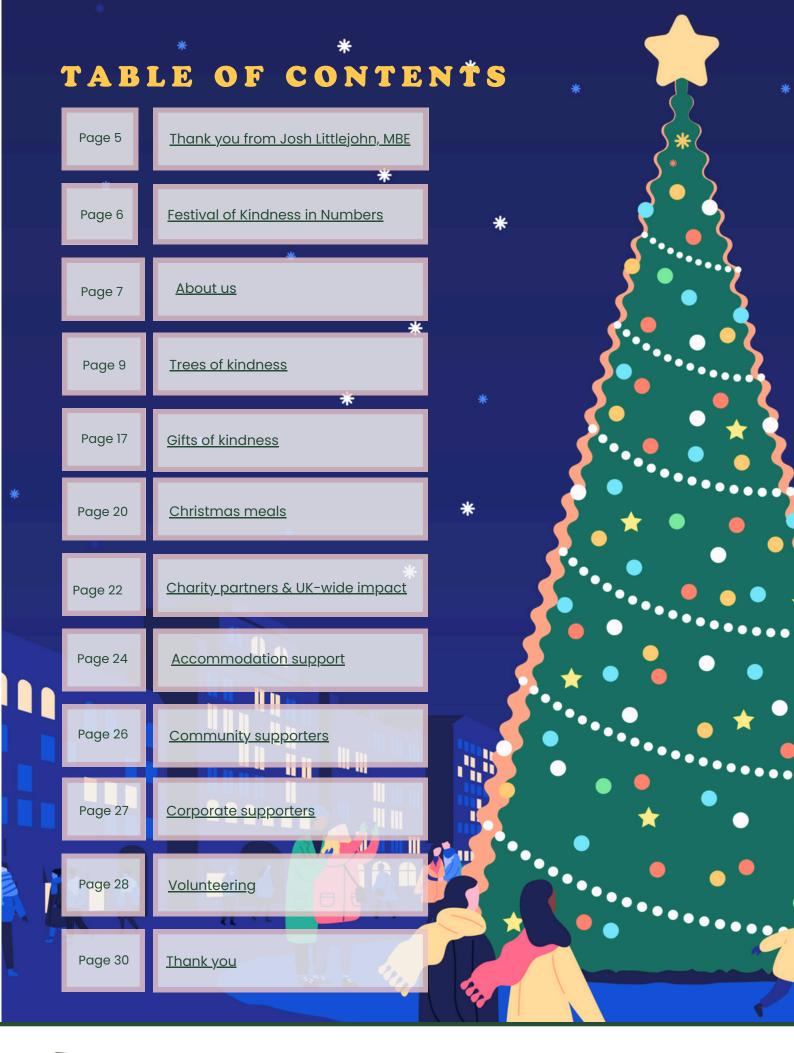


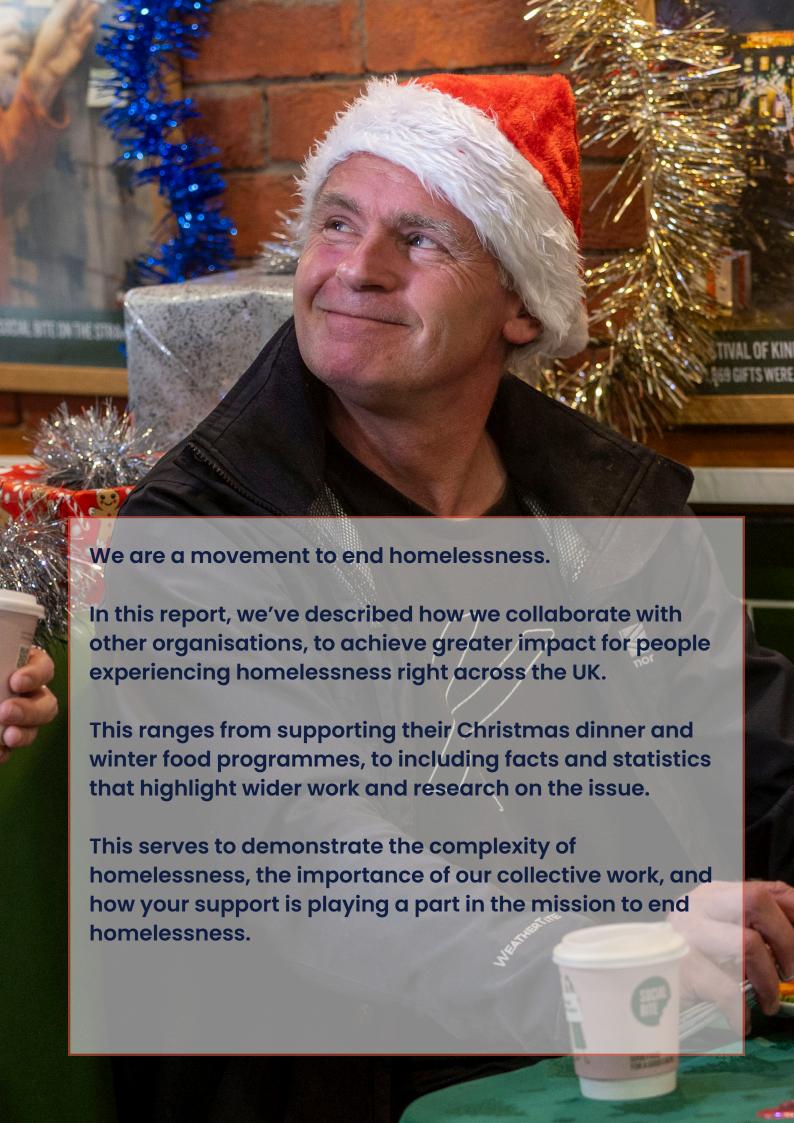

On behalf of the team at Social Bite, I would like to thank everyone who donated, volunteered, and contributed to making 2024's Festival of Kindness campaign a success.

For ten years, Social Bite has been opening our coffee shops in Scotland to host Christmas meals for people experiencing homelessness. We wanted to offer a place of friendship, safety, and warmth at a time that so many find difficult. In 2020, in the wake of the pandemic, we wanted to do more to help society's most vulnerable, and we launched the Festival of Kindness with the aim of providing additional support in the form of gifts where people would otherwise go without, meals throughout the winter, and emergency accommodation with wrap-around support during the coldest months of the year. Thanks to your incredible generosity, this UK-wide relief effort has now distributed over 1.4 million meals, gifts, and essential items to people nationwide.

But the mission continues. The cost-of-living crisis is affecting us all, but for homeless and vulnerable people, the impact has been devastating. The growing economic challenges faced by society have led to worsening homelessness statistics, impacting more individuals in deeper and longer-lasting ways. At the time of writing this, over 4,000 people are living in temporary accommodation in Glasgow. Last year, over 11,000 people had no choice but to rough sleep in London. The UK tops the global lead tables, with the highest rate of homelessness in the developed world; one in every 200 households is living in temporary accommodation.

Social Bite's vision is a society where no one should have to be homeless. While the challenges ahead are immense, your support gives us hope. Every donor is important and incredibly valued, and everything you have given has contributed to ending homelessness.

There are so many stories I could share. To the little boy who donated his pocket money to our Tree of Kindness in London: thank you. To the volunteers who packed rucksacks, paired socks, and carried bags of donated gifts up and down stairs: thank you. To the companies who held Christmas jumper days, bake sales, and secret Santas: thank you. And to anyone who has contributed what they can: thank you.

Thank you for being part of this movement of kindness to spread festive goodwill and muchneeded support to people who are homeless and vulnerable this Christmas all over the UK.

To every person, community group, school, college, university and company who collected toys, games, jackets and other items of warm clothing and donated these to our 5 Trees of Kindness.



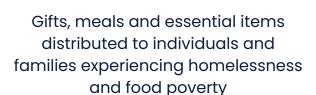

About Social Bite

We are a charity and social business providing homes, jobs, food, and support to help people transform their lives and leave homelessness behind for good.

We began life as a sandwich shop on Edinburgh's Rose Street in 2012 and we became dedicated to ending homelessness when a Big Issue seller named Pete plucked up the courage to ask for a job. We now have a network of coffee shops and a charity that provide people with food, support, housing and employment opportunities.

Following the success of the first Social Bite Village in Edinburgh, we're now on a mission to build more villages in South Lanarkshire and Dundee, too. These villages are just one of several innovative projects we're driving to help thousands of people to break the cycle of homelessness.

COFFEE SHOPS WITH A DIFFERENCE



Enjoy good food for a good cause at our social enterprise coffee shops in Edinburgh, Glasgow, Aberdeen or London. Our coffee fuels more than just your day: every purchase helps provide jobs, homes, food and support for people experiencing homelessness.

PAY IT FORWARD



We operate a pay it forward system in all of our coffee shops, where you can pay for a hot meal for someone experiencing homelessness. Our pay it forward programme has powered our free food service for more than a decade.

UK-WIDE IMPACT

In addition to our own support programmes, we partner with more than a hundred organisations providing grass-roots support for people experiencing homelessness across the UK.



We form local partnerships in the hearts of communities nationwide with organisations who share our mission and values, to reach people in need with tangible support at Christmas and throughout the winter.

SOCIAL BITE VILLAGES

Social Bite Villages are an innovative alternative to unsuitable temporary accommodation (such as B&Bs), which are costly and ineffective, with poor social outcomes. We provide dignified, high-quality living spaces in a stable and supported environment, offering the right conditions and opportunities for people from situations of homelessness to build independent lives.







What is the Festival of Kindness?

The Festival of Kindness is an annual campaign that harnesses the power of community to spread joy and kindness, and provide vital support for people who are homeless and vulnerable at Christmas and throughout the winter. Our goal in 2024 was to provide **300,000 Christmas dinners, winter meals, gifts and essentials for people in need.**

The Festival of Kindness 2024 saw people nationwide donate money for meals, gifts, essentials and accommodation as well as bringing gifts from a wish list directly to city centre Trees of Kindness, and volunteering their time to help deliver this UK-wide relief effort. It was amazing to see people from all walks of life come together with acts of kindness that collectively resulted in exceeding the goal and providing an incredible **310,410** Christmas dinners, gifts, essential items, and meals throughout the winter and beyond. Thank you.

- Our stunning city centre Trees of Kindness were open daily in Edinburgh, Glasgow, Aberdeen, Dundee and London throughout December.
- Almost 14,000 gifts from a wish list were dropped off by kind-hearted supporters – from warm clothing and toiletries, to toys for children in homeless accommodation.
- Together with generous donations of stock from corporate partners, and donations for gifts through our website, we were able to distribute an amazing 72,544 gifts and essential items to people experiencing homelessness and hardship this Christmas.
- We were also able to fund 865 nights of emergency sheltered accommodation for people experiencing homelessness in Glasgow, Edinburgh and London over Christmas and the winter months.

We were able to provide almost a quarter of a million meals for individuals, families and children experiencing homelessness and food poverty, including:

Trees of Kindness

This year, we once again installed our spectacular 10 metre-high city centre Trees of Kindness in Edinburgh, Aberdeen, Dundee, Glasgow and London. They were open seven days a week throughout December for; supporters and members of the public to drop off gifts and essentials from a wish list, donate money to fund meals and support, and volunteer in shifts to help with the campaign. We then distributed the gifts that were donated to people experiencing homelessness and hardship, in time for Christmas.

The trees have become a symbol of kindness, and donating at the trees has become part of people's Christmas routine. This year we were once again astounded by the public's generosity. Over 800 gifts were donated to our Edinburgh tree in one day alone, and there are countless stories of amazing acts of kindness and empathy. Throughout this report you will see examples of how people have gone above and beyond to support the campaign and extend generosity and kindness to people experiencing homeless.

Edinburgh's Tree of Kindness



For the first time this year, the Edinburgh Tree of Kindness was based on Castle Street and became a focus point for members of the public to donate gifts and essential items to the campaign.

Over the winter period, Edinburgh faced a crisis, the numbers of rough sleepers in the city increased due to a variety of reasons. The Edinburgh tree responded to that with a focus on collecting warm clothing, new high-grade sleeping bags, hats and gloves to provide some short-term comfort; we also worked with charity partners in the city to support with longer-term solutions to break the cycle of homelessness. Glasgow's Tree of Kindness



In the heart of the west end, the Glasgow Tree of Kindness had its most successful year ever!

Glasgow is currently in the midst of a temporary accommodation crisis, with over <u>4,000 people</u> living in temporary accommodation in the city in December 2024. Social Bite responded to this challenge, working with several local charity partners in the city to fund emergency, crisis accommodation and support to people rough sleeping. <u>See page</u> 25 for more information.

Aberdeen's Tree of Kindness



The Aberdeen tree provides a gateway to the north of Scotland, allowing us to support people from more rural communities experiencing poverty and homelessness.

Last year, Aberdeen saw a <u>69% increase</u> in the number of households living in temporary accommodation and the number of children in temporary accommodation doubled in that same period.

- Donating £4,249.63 directly to the Aberdeen tree. The most the tree has ever received- thank you. This helped to fund Christmas dinners, winter meals, gifts and essentials.

London's Tree of Kindness



For the last four years, the tree has been based outside Charing Cross Station, across from the Social Bite coffee shop on the Strand. The tree has been incredibly well supported by visitors and the local community.

Westminster has continuously reported the highest rates of rough sleepers of all London boroughs. In 2023–2024, **2,102** people were seen to be rough sleeping. The average waiting time for a local authority family home is around **11 years**, meaning that many people will spend their lives waiting for a secure, permanent home.

Giving the gift of kindness

This year, we distributed over **72,000** gifts and essential items to people in need throughout Scotland and across London. We did this through our own services and through our network of **80** charity partners and grassroots community projects. These organisations were chosen because they align with Social Bite's mission and values and work within the following areas:

We ask charities to provide a 'wish list' of items that people experiencing homelessness and poverty need and value over the Christmas period, with dignity and lived experience being at the heart of the campaign.

Supporters and members of the public are then invited to donate gifts and essential items from the wish list at our Trees of Kindness in the run-up to Christmas.

Giving the gift of kindness

Donated items are then sent to a storage facility. In Scotland this year it was Livi Self Storage and in London it was an empty retail unit in Covent Garden. Here, staff and volunteers check, count, and match donations to the local charity wish lists (see image below). Volunteer drivers deliver the items directly to the local charities and grassroots projects for them to distribute to people in need in time for Christmas.

Barbara Haig (Babs), Innovation and Distribution Lead at Social Bite, reflects on the importance of the Festival of Kindness campaign:



"One of the most touching parts of my job is reading the handwritten Christmas cards, many from children who've taken the time to include drawings. We make sure these cards are given out at night shelters, ensuring everyone has one at their place alongside their food and presents. It can be emotional, but it's such a privilege to be a part of it. There's nothing glamorous about Christmas distribution—it's messy, involves heavy lifting, and long hours—but it's the best feeling in the world when we finally get that last order out the door, just in time for Christmas."

At Social Bite, we ask that donations be new items. When people ask us why, we explain that it's about dignity and equality; alongside this, we do not have the facilities to dry clean or repair donations; the turnaround time is very quick! Sometimes, just hours between gifts being donated to the trees and going on to a charity partner who will place it in the hands of someone in need. But fundamentally, we believe that everyone has the right to receive something new purchased with someone in mind, and it underlines our belief that 'there is no them and us, only us.'

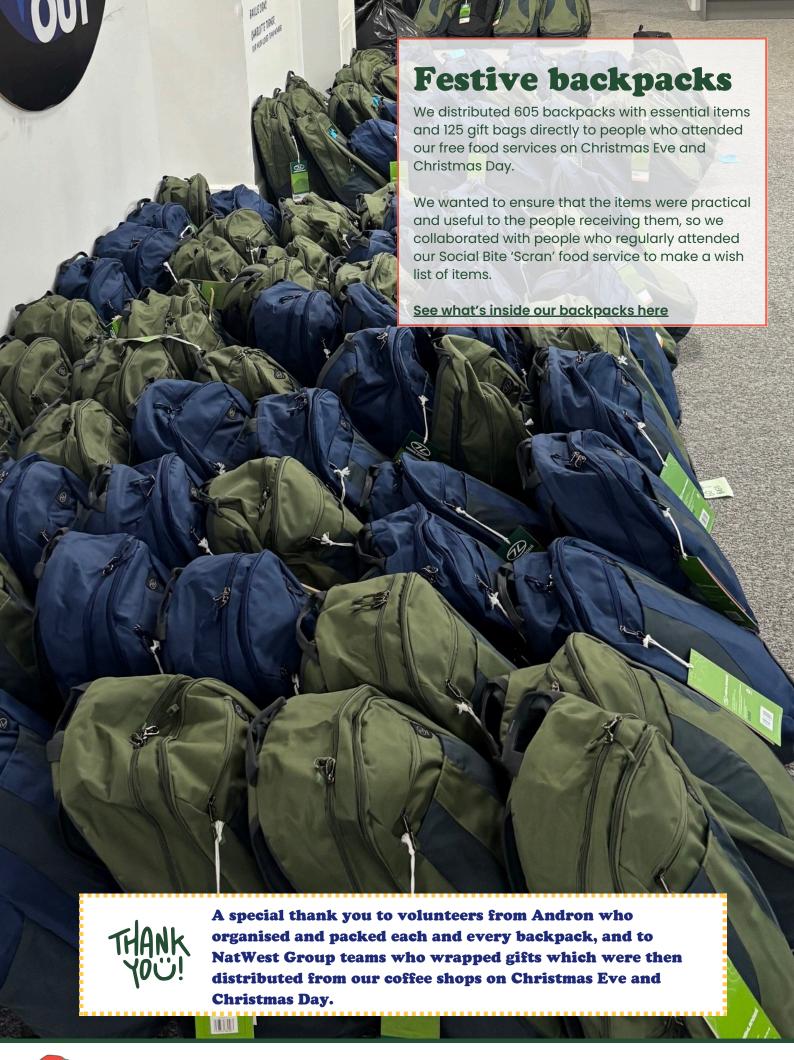

Christmas meals

Alongside our weekly food provision, every Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, Social Bite coffee shops in Scotland provide free Christmas dinner with all the trimmings, a gift, and loving company for people who are homeless and vulnerable.

It also provides an opportunity for someone to make friends, access support, and begin their journey towards ending homelessness. In 2024, with your support, we were able to directly serve 701 Christmas dinners in our shops.

Christmas meals

We asked our friend N. to tell us what Christmas at Social Bite means to her:

"Every day, I came to Social Bite to eat. I came for breakfast, and I would come back in the afternoon. Every single day. I was always made to feel welcome. Social Bite means a lot to me. When you're going through homelessness, you don't have anything. You have nothing. I really like the service they provide and I like the people at Social Bite. They're a very helpful charity. Before, I would be very hungry and didn't have access to food. For me, without Social Bite I don't know where I'd be. They helped me a lot. They are very supportive people. Amazing people.

"I also go to the charity at Christmas time. Christmas is amazing at Social Bite. Last year, I went to the Social Bite Christmas Eve food service. There was lots of food. Lots of drinks, tea, coffee. The family who hosted me in Southside a few years ago have kept in touch. They met me at Social Bite on Christmas Eve, brought gifts and we enjoyed a hot Christmas meal together. The following day, Christmas Day, I was home alone and lonely. I called the Social Bite Support Worker in Glasgow, Euan, and asked if I could come to the coffee shop again. He said, "of course!" Unfortunately, I couldn't afford a taxi because rates on Christmas day were double. So, I walked for an hour each way to get to the Social Bite coffee shop, just to be around supportive people.

"You know, Christmas is a time where everyone is getting presents. Receiving gifts from Social Bite at Christmas, it feels like getting gifts from my family. My own family are far away, but when I come to Social Bite it feels like home. It's my first home on coming to Glasgow. Social Bite is part of my family. It means so much to me. I love Social Bite, I love Social Bite to pieces."

UK-wide impact

Social Bite extends its mission by partnering with remarkable charitable organisations throughout the UK, enhancing our outreach and impact while nurturing a culture of collaboration.

Our extensive network and partnerships with grassroots organisations and charities reaches diverse locations in over 190 towns, cities and communities across the UK; the charities are chosen because they align with our mission and support people in their community experiencing homelessness or living in poverty. Thanks to our amazing corporate supporters, this year we donated over 149,000 meals throughout the UK.

This Festival of Kindness, we offered grants to <u>20</u> <u>charity partners</u>, enabling them to deliver winter meals to the people they serve, fostering opportunities for individuals to access vital support and strengthen community bonds:

'The winter grant scheme from the Social Bite has helped hundreds of people these last few years, providing them with either a warm meal, food vouchers, or food hampers over the winter period. We are so grateful to be part of this wonderful initiative.'

Thanks to funding from Social Bite towards winter food provision, Seaview in Hastings was able to make a significant change to a guests life:

'Client X is an older gentleman, he has been able to access free nutritional meals at Seaview daily, enjoying hot and cold drinks too whilst accessing the laundry facilities. This gentleman was vulnerable and being exploited, so having the free meals was essential. Seaview made a referral to Adult Social Care which has resulted in a safeguarding plan being put in place. In addition, a deep clean of the flat and unwanted possessions were removed. Client X reports that Seaview has really helped him rebuild his life and given him a sense of purpose. He feels that his life matters to others at Seaview and he tries to ensure other people feel welcome when they come to Seaview.'



Charity partner spotlight: Upper Room, London

Alongside festive meals in our coffee shops in Edinburgh, Glasgow and Aberdeen, we also partner with a network of 57 grassroots organisations in Scotland and London to provide reheatable meals and Christmas dinners for distribution to their local communities. Over 10,000 people received a free Christmas meal during Festival of Kindness 2024.

The Upper Room (UR), a charity based in West London, has been one of our valued partners since 2021. UR4 Meals Manager, Ashley Robinson, has helped facilitate the charity's receipt of donations and Christmas meal ingredients. Ashley highlighted the vital role that support from Social Bite plays in helping The Upper Room provide meals to the community.



'It gave many people [sic] a Christmas that otherwise they would not have had. It helped to tackle the loneliness and isolation that so many experience. Christmas can be a time of reflection on loss, trauma, and difficulties for our service users. Having a safe space with a warm meal, friendly volunteers, and additional support makes a huge difference to their physical and emotional wellbeing.'

What does your charity do?

The Upper Room is a West London charity dedicated to supporting homeless and vulnerable people through food aid, employment support, and social reintegration programmes. We believe in empowering individuals to improve their lives and build a better future.

Why is The Upper Room so needed at Christmas?

The Upper Room is especially needed at Christmas time because it can be particularly difficult for people experiencing homelessness, food insecurity, and social isolation. We offer a free warm space, providing relief from often harsh weather conditions. For many, our Christmas dinner is the only chance they have to share in festivities.

What items did you receive from the Festival of Kindness campaign in 2024?

We received a selection of Christmas gifts and meal ingredients for 250 meals.

Why is it important that the food donated is good quality?

Traditionally, people experiencing hardship have limited access to anything beyond high calorie, low nutrient food. Thanks to the good quality food Social Bite provides, we are reversing this trend, ensuring that our service users can dine with dignity.

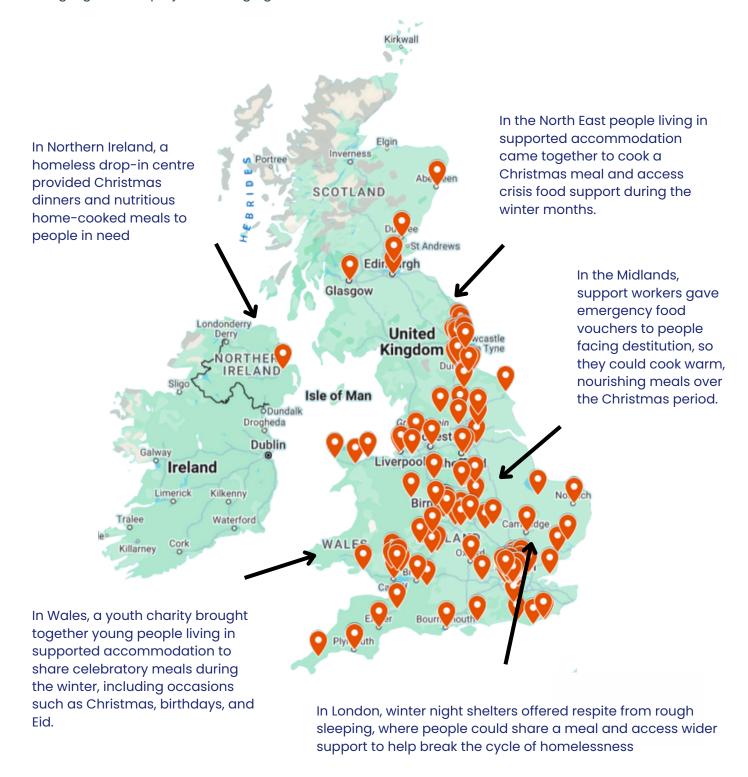

UK-wide impact

By supporting the Festival of Kindness, you're helping real people across the UK who are experiencing homelessness and food poverty receive the vital support they need from grassroots charities

A few highlights from projects changing lives in their communities:



Emergency winter accommodation and support

One of the objectives of the Festival of Kindness, alongside distributing meals and gifts, is to provide shelter and support for people in need over the winter months.

Since 2021, we have provided funding to charities in Scotland and London for emergency accommodation, supported accommodation, and support for people experiencing homelessness over the winter period. This winter, Social Bite funded over 850 emergency beds for people in Scotland and London.

Each of the charities embodies our mission, vision and values and is responding to the homelessness crisis within their own community.

Our accommodation partners for 2024 were:

"The grant funding from Social Bite will save lives. It will allow us to purchase emergency beds for people rough sleeping in Edinburgh and Glasgow. Alongside this, we can support people with in-depth casework and safety planning, which will help to stop that person from coming to harm.

How you have supported the campaign



It's been wonderful to see so many individuals, community organisations and companies joining the mission to end homelessness by supporting the Festival of Kindness. Here are a few special stories that we'd like to highlight.

Community support



Isaac (5) and his parent Craig who raised over £1,100. Craig has shared how they supported the campaign:

'On the way home from school one day, I was talking to Isaac about homelessness. He didn't realise some people did not have homes and thought it was really sad, so he wanted to do something to help. He finds running hard, so it seemed like a good challenge – running 1000m every day of Advent. He never once gave up or even moaned. Some of his school friends from Year I wanted to get involved too, and ran a couple of runs with him. I am so proud of Isaac, and so pleased that his efforts have made a difference.'







'I asked Tilly what we could do to celebrate Christmas, and she said she wanted to bake cakes to help homeless people. She decided to bake and sell cakes. She worked hard shopping, baking, decorating and delivering cakes to family and friends over a week.'





Corporate partners

Each year, our corporate partners go above and beyond to play a key part in the Festival of Kindness. Their contribution raises not only significant funds, but vital awareness amongst colleagues, customers and suppliers.

Their support includes:

- Corporate financial donations
- Donating gift-in-kind (such as stock or space)
- Colleague fundraising
- Customer-facing campaigns to raise funds and awareness
- Volunteering
- Gift-drives

Over 150 businesses (from nationwide groups to local branches) lent their support during the Festival of Kindness 2024. There are examples throughout this report, but here are a handful more:

- Mitchells & Butlers (with brands including Toby Carvery, Harvester, Browns, Miller & Carter, All Bar One and many more) placed tent cards on tables in their 1,700 restaurants and pubs throughout the UK, inviting guests to add a donation to their bill, to buy someone experiencing homeless a Christmas dinner.
- itison Invited their members to buy a voucher that would pay- forward a Christmas dinner, or dinner and gift, for someone experiencing homelessness.
 An amazing 49,931 vouchers were purchased, bringing the total to 900,000 since the partnership began.
- UNIQLO customers were invited to donate £1, £3 or £5 at tills in stores across the UK. The company also donated 10,000 thermal clothing items from their HEATTECH range.





- NatWest Rewards customers were encouraged to donate through the app, with £5 enough to buy someone homeless a Christmas dinner.
- M&G plc and Just Eat gave generous corporate donations to fund Christmas dinners and winter meals for people experiencing homelessness and food poverty across the UK.
- Sky Cares and NSL (part of Marston Holdings) provided free transport and volunteer drivers to help distribute thousands of donated gifts across Scotland and London, to help get them to people in need in time for Christmas.

Dropping gifts to charities and community organisations in Scotland and London.

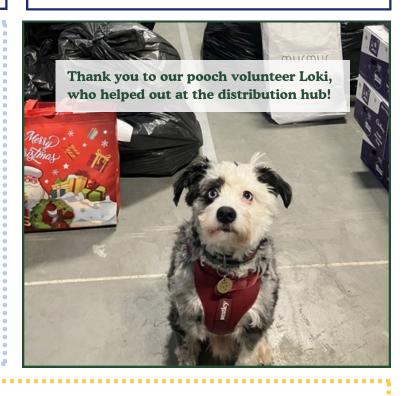
Organising and packing gifts and essential items into backpacks for distribution at our coffee shops on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

A movement of kindness - one gift at a time

Barbara (Babs) Haig, Innovation Lead at Social Bite. Shares her experience of distributing gifts and essential items to people in need during the festive period.

This is not just a physical gift, it makes people feel valued, they feel a sense of dignity, care and hope, reminding them that they are not forgotten and offering a moment of warmth and connection during a time that can feel particularly isolating.

As Innovation Lead at Social Bite, I'm proud to share my experience of the Festival of Kindness campaign. We partner with over 100 charities to distribute hot meals, gifts, and essential items to people experiencing homelessness or living in poverty. Every year, I'm amazed by the generosity we see and the dedication of everyone involved.

During the Festival of Kindness, I take on a distribution lead role, which is very hands-on and practical. My team and I work with charity partners across Scotland and London, asking them to send us wishlists of what they need to make Christmas special. These lists cover festive essentials like food, ingredients, and other items to help make a difference for people they support.

I see first-hand how much pressure charity partners feel; they want to make this time as special as possible. It's incredible to see how everyone at Social Bite pulls together to fulfil these needs—whether it's our communications team spreading the word or our kitchen staff preparing thousands of reheat-able meals.



One of the most touching parts of my job is reading the handwritten Christmas cards, many from children who've taken the time to include drawings. We make sure these cards are given out at night shelters, ensuring everyone has one at their place alongside their food and presents. It can be emotional, but it's such a privilege to be a part of it. There's nothing glamorous about Christmas distribution—it's messy, involves heavy lifting, and long hours—but it's the best feeling in the world when we finally get that last order out the door just in time for Christmas.

We also help our charity partners organize meaningful events, like Christmas parties for families in deprived areas or gatherings for people who are isolated in temporary hotel accommodation. It's all about creating a sense of warmth and connection for people who might otherwise be alone.

I remember the first year and the shock I felt at the sheer generosity as donations poured in. Each year, we carry that support with us through the cold warehouses and busy days but we work in service to others which is so important, especially during the hardest times for people who are homeless or in poverty.



Building relationships - one meal at a time

Euan Brock, Social Bite's Development and Support Worker in Glasgow, explains why free meals are so important to the people he works with.

Christmas isn't a happy and joyful time for everyone and in fact can be quite the opposite. Providing Christmas meals and presents at our coffee shops in Scotland can genuinely help someone suffering from homelessness and/or isolation to see a glimmer of light and that there is still a community that welcomes and cares for them. Seeing the joy in someone's face receiving their Christmas meal and present and getting that hug of appreciation means everything. The atmosphere at these events is like no other and it can help build a relationship with someone in this situation to receive support from us into the new year and beyond. This will be my 7th Christmas Eve and Day at Social Bite, and they continue to get better for people accessing the service every year thanks to the support we receive.

People can become homeless for a variety of reasons but sadly homelessness is becoming more common. What with rising living costs, increases in energy prices, and the cost of putting food on the table. Alongside this, many people are living in food poverty and struggling to see the end of the month, even though they're housed and employed.

It doesn't matter what someone's circumstances are – we don't ask. Everyone is welcome at Social Bite.



Food and drink are a tool of engagement, and without it people might not know about the wider services and support we offer. Attending a free food service helps to build a trusting relationship with me and the other support workers. Some people can find that hard if they've been through traumatic events, or if they're suspicious of people in an authoritative role.

Conversation and inclusion are so important to prevent isolation and loneliness becoming silent killers. It's a major part of what we do at Social Bite.

We're able to welcome people with a smile, a hot meal and a simple "how are you today?" It can make someone's day if they haven't spoken to anyone or have been ignored on the street all day. A simple "how are you?" can save lives. Anyone funding these meals should know that they're part of the solution on the road to end homelessness. Sometimes, free food helps someone who still needs to wait a couple of days, or a even a week for their next payment to come in.

The hot meal and drink provided will help people through those days to not face the hardest decision of buying food or putting themselves in debt.

This can stop a cycle of homelessness before it's even started.
